Dr. Patrick Belmont Associate Professor of Watershed Sciences S.J. & Jessie E. Quinney College of Natural Resources Utah State University

Patrick received his Ph.D. in Earth and Environmental Sciences from Lehigh University in Bethlehem, PA. Prior to coming to Utah State University in 2009, he was a Postdoctoral Associate at the University of Minnesota working with the National Center for Earth Surface Dynamics. His research combines hydrology and geomorphology with general interests in sediment dynamics and feedbacks between geomorphic and ecological systems. At Utah State University he continues to develop his research program in watershed hydrology, environmental geochemistry, and geomorphology

Brian Fischer, C.F.M. Vice President and Manager of GIS Services for HEI

Brian has shared his expertise in GIS solutions for water resources management to numerous counties and watershed districts throughout Minnesota. Those services include customized web-based GIS viewers, databases for managing permitting and inspecting programs, and other custom applications. Brian led the development of the DrainageDB and MS4Front software systems, which provide drainage authorities and cities a means to document and organizing their water resource management responsilities.
