"Friendly Connections"

- 41 high-risk seniors currently matched to volunteers
- July December over 500 phone visits to clients by our volunteers
- Connections are by phone, letter, safe-distance visit or text message
- Coordinator suggests topics and questions to discuss with clients

Nutrition

- Provided 1678 AEOA frozen meals
- Provided 1820 hot lunches from Palisade Bethel Lutheran Church Loaves and Fishes
- Added a second carry-out Community Meal with Kids Plus; provided 1181 hot dinners
- Distributed 160 produce and shelf-stable boxes through AEOA, Aitkin County CARE and Second Harvest
- Distributed 540 bags of grocery and bakery items from Kids Plus







Chore Services

- Temporarily discontinued most in-home services
- Increased snow removal and other outdoor services
- Provide snow removal to some volunteers as well

Community Outreach

- Temporarily discontinued in-person events
- Offer virtual programs, events and interactions
- Recently started in-person events for very small groups with COVID-19 restrictions
- Provided "Cuts for Vets" in November

- Drive-by birthday party and other special events for homebound clients

Building Modifications

- Purchased mobile air purifiers for Office and Activities Center
- Replaced both furnaces to include high-efficiency filters and ionization units
